

Chief Justice Court of Civil Appeals Eight Supreme Judicial District El Paso, Texas

At this time of year, as the Holiday season approaches, many people, caught up in the rush of shopping and preparing to entertain relatives, are likely to forget the very important matter of taking the necessary steps in order to be able to vote.

Some states require only registration, while others require the payment of a poll tax. Whatever the case may be, no true American can explain to himself, his family or to his international neighbors why he did not take the necessary steps to become a participating and contributing American. Every member of Congress is up for election or rejection every two years, and it is in that body that all matters of revenue must originate. In other words, the country can't spend any money until Congress has first authorized it. Who can complain, then, if he or she was not able to participate or exert his influence at the polls?

The literature of the world is full of famous examples of the failure of human beings resulting in disasters and calamities. It is also true in the political world that there have been notable instances of great national importance where one or two votes made all the difference. Legislators have had themselves carried into Congress or the Senate so as to be able to vote. The Bible, of course, contains many well-known examples of human failures in the matter of preparation.

Certainly no American could demonstrate his loyalty to his country or his love for his family any more potently and any more articulately than to keep himself in a position to vote for or against that which he believes best for his country and family. It is a well-known truth that the smaller the number of voters, the more easily they can be controlled. Let us also show to the entire world the greatest percentage of participating citizens of any country anywhere. This should be easy, because certainly no citizen of any country has as much to enjoy or look forward to as the American, and he should certainly, therefore, be not only informed and vigilant, but always in a position to cast his ballot.

It is therefore earnestly urged that every person take whatever steps are necessary this year and every year so that our national voice may remain loud and strong, both at home and abroad, and further so that you who read this can truthfully say, "I am an American."



LULAC LEADER

An outstanding citizen, Brother Ruben Flores, now serves as the President of LULAC Council 365, Las Cruces, New Mexico. In addition to this civic endeavor, Brother Flores has a superior record of citizenship.

Born in 1917, the Council 365 President is married and has three children. Mrs. Manuela Flores; daughters, Carmelina and Freda, and son, Arthur; make their home with Ruben at 418 E. Amador, Las Cruces, New Mexico.

In 1938, Brother Flores joined the Merchant Marine, receiving his training aboard the USS American Seaman, out of St Petersburg, Florida. From 1939 to 1941, he sailed as a crew member aboard the luxury liner SS America, out of New York. In April 1941, Brother Flores enlisted in the U.S. Army and was assigned to the 200th Coast Artillery Corps, Battery D. Soon after enlisting he was transferred to the Philipine Islands and served on Luzon until captured by the invading Japanese at Bataan in April 1942. After surviving the infamous "Death March" he spent the remaining war years as a prisoner of war of the Japanese in camps at Cabanatuan; Lipa; Batangas; Billibid Prison, Manila; Zablan Field, Manila; Taiwan, Formosa; and Kosaku, Japan. The end of the war with the Japanese served to make him a free man.

After a period of recuperation, he was separated from the U.S. Army in the grade of Staff Sergeant. After returning home, he was employed by the Las Cruces Police Department from April 1946 to August 1951. At this time he entered federal employment at White Sands Missile Range, the world's largest overland missile range, where he is atill employed as a supervisor.

Additionally, he is an active and participating member of the Disabled American Veterans (DAV), Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW), American Legion, Bataan Veterans' Organization, X-Prisoners of War (X-PW), Chicos and LULAC.

Since the establishment of his Council he has been one of the most supporting members and attends all National, State and District Conventions of LULAC.



The subject of the recently hired Business Manager, Mr. J. C. Machuca, was brought up. Mr. Jess Vela made a motion, seconded by Mr. Jose Flores, that Mr. Bonilla and Mr. Andow, National President and Immediate Past National President, respectively, be given the authority to discuss and do as they see fit regarding said Business Manager. Motion passed.

Mr. Paul Andow reported on the recently signed contract with International Advertising of El Paso, for publication of LULAC NEWS. Said contract is for three months, with the company taking the first \$50.00 and dividing any monies thereafter on a 50-50 basis. This matter will be discussed more fully at the time Mr. Bonilla visits El Paso on July 4.

Motion made by Mr. Bob Alaniz, seconded by Mr. Jose Flores, that no checks be issued until Mr. Bonilla gets together with Mr. Andow on dates mentioned. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mrs. Sally Martinez and seconded by Mr. Bob Alaniz that the following statement be published in the minutes of this Supreme Council Meeting, and that it be approved by acclamation. Motion passed:

The National Assembly, fully convened, commends the Imm. Past National President, Mr. Paul Andow, and all his staff, for the wonderful work during his administration. Further, that immediately after the convention adjourned, Mr. Andow met with all the elected National Officers and State Directors present and that we wish to express our appreciation and gratitude for giving us this extra time from his schedule, in view of the fact that he has been working for three full days at the National Convention.

Mr. Bob Alaniz made a motion, seconded by Mrs. Sally Martinez, that a special Supreme Council Meeting be held in Tacine, Wisconsin, Saturday, August 29, 1964, or in alternative, in Chicago, Illinois. Motion carried.

It was moved by Mrs. Martinez and seconded by Mr. Alaniz, that no committees be appointed by the National President until said special Supreme Council Meeting. Motion passed.

Mr. Paul Andow reported that the following councils had submitted application for charter:

Del Rio #18, Reactivated; Monrovia #398, New; Pico Rivera #399, New; and Hurley #400, New.

Mr. Jose Flores moved that charter be granted to said councils. Seconded by Mr. Joseph Gomez, Motion passed.

Mr. Paul Andow moved that Honorary Membership be extended to Mr. Malcolm McGregor for the many services rendered to LULAC. Seconded by Mr. David Adame. Passed unanimously. The First Regular Supreme Council Meeting will be held in California during the month of November. Exact place and date will be announced later.

Meeting adjourned at 5:45 P. M.

Secondly, through correspondence with the State Superintendent of Public Instruction at Austin a certain discriminatory practice was removed and settled. In many places in Texas where public high schools were located it was the practice not to permit Spanish speaking students to attend the high schools. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction issued an ultimatum to the local school boards advising them that the Texas state school funds would be withheld should they insist on barring Latin American students from attending the state high schools.

We have said it before and we will say it again that the Martinez administration has a very marked distinction: It was Lulac's Golden Era in the State of New Mexico.

SPECIAL SUPREME COUNCIL MEETING

Brother Bonilla reconvened the meeting at 3:45 P.M. and stated that the answer to Sister Lujan's first question was in Article VI, Section 2 of the constitution. The State Director has as much power as to remove a District Director if he is not carrying out his job properly.

Brother Joseph Lucero, Deputy State Director, Minnesota, made a motion, (after lengthy discussion), that proceeds of the Folks Fair project of Chicago, Illinois, be divided equally among the participating councils and that each council decide what they want to do with its share of its proceeds, as long as it is in accordance with the constitution. Brother Jose Flores, State Director, Wisconsin, seconded the motion. Motion passed.

Brother Flores, State Director, Wisconsin, asked if Legal Advisor and Legislation were attorneys.

Brother Bonilla stated that the Legal Advisor was an attorney but the Legislator did not have to be an attorney.

Brother Joseph Lucero, Deputy State Director, Minnesota, made a motion that all of the appointments made by the National President be approved as a whole.

Brother Joe Gomez, State Director, Iowa, seconded the motion. Motion Passed.

Brother David Lopez, National Director of Publicity was given the floor to discuss his project of a Lulac magazine. The magazine would be on slick paper, good production and subscription for magazine would be \$5.00 per year (\$1.00 to go to council selling the subscription). National ads such as Texaco and Pepsi-Cola would have to be sold and councils would need to let National Publicity Chairman know of anything newsworthy immediately in order for this magazine to be successful.

Brother Joseph Lucero, Deputy State Director, Minnesota, made motion that Supreme Council empower Brother Lopez, National Director of Publicity, to carry out his project of a Lulac magazine.

Brother Edward Modesto, State Director, Indiana, seconded the motion. Motion Passed.

Dropouts

By William A. Burgett Instructor Texas Western College

The problem of school droputs is a problem that is of community concern and also of personal concern to every parent. If our child is not a droput he may have to support the next child who is a dropout and he may suffer from the same problems that make that child a dropout.

The first four reasons given for

dropouts are:

a. Frustration (unable to do school work)

b. Lack of interest in academic work

c. School program did not fit pupil needs

d. The administrators and teachers were not genuinely interested in the pupil.

Those youngsters not motivated toward academic work and those nor properly prepared at the basic levels become dropouts. Tests show that over 75% of dropouts are poor readers. Poor reading leads directly to frustration and lack of interest in academic work.

More attention to reading ability and correction of individual reading problems would help every youngster In the high schools of the nation 25% of each grade reads two grade levels below his position in school. Spanish speaking youngsters have a double problem in reading English well. Reading tests and remedial reading instruction will provide improvement and other methods for helping the children should be used.

Groups of parents interested in helping the children should appeal to the school board to take specific action and should support candidates determined to act to meet the dropout

and the related problems.

Brother Bob Alaniz, State Director, Illinois, made motion that the two appointments to assist the National Director of Publicity be approved.

Brother Jose Flores, State Director, Wisconsin, seconded the motion.

He stated we would be insured by Girard Insurance Company, \$10,000 Life, and that 7% of monies made from premiums on first year will go to the Lulac Treasury and after the first year 5% of monies made from premiums will go to the Lulac Treasury. No money will be coming out of the Lulac Treasury to sponsor this project. Age limit is 60 years of age but that will be changed.

Brother Jose Flores, State Director, Wisconsin, made a motion that we accept the Insurance Program.

Brother Bonilla, National President, stated that at the last Supreme Council Meeting the Treasurer's report showed National Treasury to have \$13,500.00 as of May 31, 1964. After May 31, 1964, \$2,500.00 was withdrawn by the past administration. Then outstanding bills were paid by new administration and after all that was paid out that left the National Treasury with no money. FHA was after LULAC to pay \$5,475.00 that Villa Del Norte Apartments owed, so the \$5,000 that was in a trust fund for an emergency was withdrawn to pay this bill. \$3,000 was received

by National President but after paying other outstanding bills, which included the LULAC printing press and expenses of National President to Washington, D. C., that leaves approximately \$800.00 in National Treasury.

Brother BONILLA, National President, further stated that LULAC homes is costing more to keep it in operation than we are drawing from rentals.

LULAC homes is draining our National treasury. Also, we are not using LULAC printing press because we can get printing done at less cost through commercial printers. It has been suggested that we sell LULAC homes and the LULAC printing press. Brother BONILLA requested a decision of the Supreme Council.

Brother Bob ALANIZ, State Director, Illinois - made motion that if National President feels it is practical to sell press, that he do so, if necessary.

Brother Joseph LUCERO, Deputy State Director, Minnesota - seconded the motion.

MOTION PASSED.

Brother Joseph LUCERO, Deputy State Director, Minnesota - made motion that Brother William BONILLA (National President), Mr. Berroteran and Mr. Jacquez be given the power to make decision to sell LULAC homes if it became necessary.

Brother Bob ALANIZ, State Director, Illinois - seconded the motion.

Brother William D. BONTLLA, National President - commented that he had organized councils in New York, Virginia, Washington, D.C., Oklahoma and in Louisiana. By November of this year they should be new councils from these states in LULAC. "Its' easy and I have only been in office 60 days".

There being no further business to discuss or to be brought before the Supreme Council, the meeting was declared adjourned at 6:30 P.M. by our National President, Brother William D. BONILLA.



JEWS SECOND LARGEST GROUP TO VOTE FOR PRESIDENT

According to the Voter Profile Analysis used by the Columbia Broadcasting Company the Jewish vote for the President Johnson was about 90%, just about 5% below that cast by the Negro.

Nine Jews were reelected to the House and six more were elected, five for the first time. Most of the Jewish candidates were elected by large margins. Sydney R. Yates regained his seat in Illinois. He had given it up to run for the Senate in 1962.

Modesto Gomez of El Paso became President when Ben Osuna of Albuquerque joined the Armed Forces and resigned. Atty. Osuna's term, to date, is the shortest that any LULAC National President has served.

The LULAC National Home was bought during Hector Godinez administration. This is the first permanent home office LULAC has had in its 35 years of existance.

Atty. John J. Herrera demonstrated real sportsmanship and dedication to the League when he voted for Dr. Geo J. Garza his opponent; the vote needed to swing the election either way.

One Judge J. T. Canales offered LULAC \$26,000.00 in scholarships for distribution. LULAC to make the selections of the recepients. LULAC never picked up the offer. Judge Canales is a Past National President.

Dr. Jose Maldonado of Santa Fe, is the only medical man to have served as President of LULAC to date.

To stop discrimination in the public schools LULAC has gone to court on three different occassions; the administrations of Arnulfo Zamora of Laredo, Raul Cortez of San Antonio and Atty. Albert Armendariz of El Paso.

El Paso, Texas has produced five National Presidents, Modesto A. Gomez, Atty. Frank Galvan, William Flores, Atty. Albert Armendariz and Atty. Paul Andow.
